Dear Martin,

While in China I had to stop correspondence with you as ^{of the State} the Reds considered "American imperialism" and connections the greatest crime. I left Tientsin on Sept. 13th. and was thrilled to enjoy freedom again. I arrived in Stockholm Oct. 8th. after having spent one week in Israel. It was a wonderful time and a happy reunion with Heller relatives and friends on my arrival.

I would have liked to travel via the States, but that may be another time. Hellen enjoyed her stay there very much. My brother Egon will fly to Japan leaving Stockholm this 28th. Mother is planning to visit the States. Not bad at 84!

I have recently sent Secretary Danielson a letter about your Mission in Tsingtao. I thought he should have the inside information. I am enclosing an article about the general missionary situation in China. May be you think it is too radical to print? I think our people at home ought to know the actual situation. More details could be added, but then it would be easier for Communists to check up out there.

It was quite a problem to know what one should tell the reporters and also over the Radio. I am becoming more convinced that it is about time the truth was told about the Reds in China. They will carry out their policy even if we do not say anything.
